June and July church services are on the back cover; Bible Readings are on page 8 and 9 For services in the Lifton Benefice, see page 24 As I said in my introduction in last Parish News, Revelation is a challenging book to understand and different interpretations of it have, and are being made. However most scholars consider that it would have been well understood by its first century readers.



The main source I have relied on is the People's Bible Commentary - a Bible Reading Fellowship publication based on the New Revised Standard Version (NRSV) of the bible; also my own NIV study bible.

In Revelation, numbers or a series of numbers, are used particularly the number 7, which means completeness. A prime example of the number 7 is Gods 'creation of the world in 6 days and followed by resting on the seventh' *Genesis 1.1 to 2. 1* from which we get the 7 days of the week.

In Revelation 1 .9-20 we have greetings to the 7 churches in the province of Asia (now modern day Turkey) directed to be given by someone like the 'son of man' standing by 7 lampstands and holding in his hand 7 stars. These are to be given by angels of the churches. The major role of an angel is that of a messenger as well as a guardian to the respective churches. These churches are in different degrees of their Christian development and adherence, which applies to and are instructive for churches/Christian communities today. In chapters 2 and 3 the churches are listed, namely Ephesus, Smyrna, Thyatira, Pergamum, Sardis, Philadelphia and Laodicea.

Ephesus was one of the major cities of the Roman province of Asia, where Paul preached (Acts 19.23-41) The city was a prosperous port and trading centre dominated by the great temple of Artemis, the Greek god of nature. In the midst of such a city it would have been easy for the Christian community to be led astray, but they had stood firm in their faith. However they had become very zealous in their defence of right doctrine and neglected the virtues of love and tolerance. Thus they became judgemental of others. The message for us today, as then, is to hold fast to the faith, but never losing adherence to the great commandment to love.

Smyrna, a city famed for the grandeur of its buildings, was a centre for the worship of the Roman Emperor and the home to a large Jewish community. In contrast the Christian community was poor and persecuted yet their poverty was more than offset by their spiritual wealth. The message applicable sadly for today's persecuted Christians is, as the Smyrnans believed, that the worst that can happen is not death in this life, but the loss of eternal life.

Thyatira was politically the least important of the 7 cities yet it receives the longest message. A message that compliments the church for their increase in deeds, love, faith, service and perseverance 2: 19. Reference is made to Jezebel the pagan wife to Ahab, the legendary perverter of the faith of Israel (see the second book of Kings) in relation to an alleged prophetess of the same name. She taught sexual immorality and the eating of food sacrificed to idols and the church ceased to tolerate her. It would be ideal if a community growing in love and service would gain the respect of their non Christian neighbours but this, as we are aware in part of today's world, appears not to be so. However the message from Christ in this letter is to 'hold onto what you have until I come' Revelation 2.26. A reference to the final coming of Christ is detailed in the final chapters of Revelation. **Pergamum**, as my Peoples' commentary describes it was 'the devil's capital' being the site of the great temple to the Greek god Zeus and a centre of worship to Asklepios, the god of healing. In Paul's first letter to the Corinthians 10.20, reference is made to abstaining from sacrifices made by pagans and offered to demons. It was for this opposition that '*Antipas, my faithful witness*' was put to death: 2.13 The message here to the Pergamum Christians was to accept that the church faces persecution and to identify this and resist such temptations to paganism.


Sardis had once been the capital of king of Lydia and was fabled for its wealth, but now it was in decline and the church, although still in existence, was dormant: *'but you are dead, Wake up'* 3,1-3. Revelation does not tell exactly what is happening with the church there, but it seems to lack Christian fervour and action as it once had. So for us today the message is that having faith without action equates with dead faith: *'faith without good works is dead '* see James 4.20. Faith and action is crucial to our church life and witness.

To **Philadelphia**, like to the church in Smyrna, the message carries no condemnation. It is a church that appears weak to others, but a Christian community faithful to Jesus notwithstanding the persecution by the local Jewish community 3.9. The message here is the promise that the Lord will keep his followers firm and certain of their final reward through faith and hope in the troubles that lie ahead 3.10.

Laodicea was fabled for its wealth, (as Sardis had been being the banking centre) occasioned by the local thriving wool industry. Also, nearby were hot springs reputed for their medical properties. Even in the 'dead' church of Sardis there were some faithful believers, but of Laodicea there is nothing positive to say as my commentary states, maintaining, like the hot springs, that they have eventually become lukewarm in their faith '*neither hot nor cold, I wish you were either one or the other*' 3.15. The message for Christian churches/communities as well as for individuals then, and also today, is to guard against the negative attitude of being 'lukewarm', of being complacent i.e. in spiritual blindness and poverty of faith.

In the my next article on the book of Revelation I will comment on the significance of the number 7 in relation to the seals, trumpets and bowls, as detailed in chapters 8 to 16.

Dear Friends,

How would you describe a tiger to someone who has never seen one? You probably wouldn't use this dictionary definition: "Fierce Asiatic feline mammal, tawny in colour, with black stripes."

But whatever words you used, you couldn't fully convey the beauty, power and energy of that magnificent creature. A photograph taken at my wedding in Nottingham, for example, portrays the people who were there and what they were wearing. What it won't convey are the complex personalities and dynamic relationships, the sense of family history and shared experiences.

There are all kinds of things that we need to experience personally before we can understand what they're like. If this applies to tigers and families, how much more will it be true of anything concerning God and our relationship with him as Father, Son and Holy Spirit?

A website called "allaboutgod.com" gives us this definition that tries to explain the Holy Trinity, for example: "There is one God, eternally existing in three persons: Father, Son (Jesus Christ) and Holy Spirit. The three persons of the Godhead are co-equal and co-eternal."

But words are inadequate. We can't pin down an elusive mystery and restrict it in a lifeless form. We need to find ways of expressing our understanding of the Holy Trinity in terms of energy, relationship and creativity within the Trinity itself. Then we need to go beyond that to discover something of the dynamic energy that exists in the relationship between God in three persons and his beloved creation.

The Holy Trinity in action is like a loving Father, taking the initiative in sending his Son to save a world that may not know it needs saving. The Holy Trinity in action is like Jesus, Son of God and Son of Man. He shows us what God and love look like in human form and identifies himself with human pain and suffering. The Holy Trinity in action is the Holy Spirit, bringing new birth, new identity and the invitation to join in the dance of love and delight that is God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

God reaches out to each of us personally, inviting us to join in that holy dance. How are we to respond? Being born into a new life might sound scary – a journey into the unknown. Everything will be new and different and we will be totally dependent on the Being who has given us this new birth. Believing that that Being has given us new birth out of love for us, we can also believe that the family of the Holy Trinity will receive us with joy and delight and a faithfulness on which we can safely depend.



The words of Paul to the Romans give us further insight into our relationship with God. The Spirit, through which we receive the gift of eternal life, is not a spirit of fear leading us into captivity. It's a spirit of adoption, a form of new birth, which draws us into the family of God, Father and Son, so that we too can call God, "Abba, Father". We are children of God. Images of God as Father and the Holy Trinity as family may be painful for some. Sometimes words get in the way of truth and understanding. What's important to say today about the Holy Trinity, God in three persons, is this:

God loves the world and acts to save it from its own folly. God offers new life to all who seek it.

It's for us to respond joyfully and join in the dance of love and salvation which is for all people for all time.

Stage door Johnnie



Among all the sounds of the early summer countryside, the busy gentle hum of bees, the cry of lambs, the song of blackbird, song thrush, tit, lark and robin, the coo of wood pigeon and collared dove, twitter of swallows and the conversation of cow and calf;

cries of all the young things that are mating and breeding and being hatched and reared and fed, amongst all these sounds one of the strangest is the drumming of the snipe.

Snipe, in Gaelic, *gabharin reo,* 'little goat of the frost', are described by the poet John Clare as a:

'Lover of swamps And quagmire overgrown With hasssock tufts of sedge.'



Bluebell has been out on to the High Moor on Dartmoor to hear this mating call. The night was dark and still, and the moon young, obscured by cloud. In the last light of dusk Bluebell followed a small track across the marshy tussocks towards two violent, noisy little moorland streams. Settling down in a damp rocky hollow under clumps of sedge, Bluebell waited silently as darkness fell.

The night grew cold. The only sound was the rattling of water over the rocks in the stream. Then Bluebell heard the chirps of a female snipe in the mire nearby. Soon began the captivating territorial display of the male snipe, which can continue long into the night on warm, still summer evenings. Mainly due to habitat

loss, fewer snipe breed in Southern England and Ireland, and many people have never heard or seen the snipe's courtship. The male bird climbs to an altitude of about 50m (165 ft) above the ground before diving repeatedly and steeply at about 40 degrees with its two outer tail feathers extended, making a strange, rising tremulous noise that rather resembles the bleating of a sheep or goat, and which is usually described as 'drumming'. *Birds Britannica; Mark Cocker and Richard Mabey 2005*

In 2010 high speed video revealed that the tail feathers flapped like a flag in the wind, making an audible sound when the bird dived at a



speed between 50km/h (31mph), and 86km/h (53mph). This is called "aeroelastic flutter", a self-feeding, potentially destructive vibration. It was aeroelastic flutter that caused the Tacoma Narrows suspension bridge in the US to famously wobble and collapse in November 1940, just a few months after it opened. *Dr Roland Ennos, University of Manchester, Faculty of Life Sciences, quoted by Mark Kinver BBC News, Science and Environment, 28 April 2010.*

I always thought they were a bit 'Victorian'. Well, perhaps I'm Victorian! If you have some, now is the time after flowering to divide and repot. (As if we didn't have enough to do!)

Wallflowers – Doug's a fan of these too. Between now and July is the best time



to sow seed so they flower next spring, as they're biennials. I sow them in modular trays, grow them on and then eventually plant them out wherever there's space where you want them to flower. This year I've had a lot in amongst the blue bells – red and yellow wallflowers – beautiful. Go for the full sized ones rather than the dwarfs.

Oh, it's time to thrash the top of the moss or, if you're posh, *mow the lawn.* Good luck with the grass this year!






