The Old Testament

The Old Testament, known to the Jews as the Hebrew Scriptures, comprises 39 books of the Christian bible. These books are the holy writings (or scriptures) of the Jewish people and were initially written in Hebrew or Aramaic, and are divided basically into 4 sections:

- 1)The first five books of the Law (the Hebrew Torah, also known from the Greek as the Pentateuch) from Genesis to Deuteronomy
- 2) The History books from Joshua to Esther
- 3) The Wisdom books of Job, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, the Psalms and the Song of Solomon
- 4) Seventeen books of the Prophets from Isaiah to Malachi.
- 1) Excluding Genesis, these record the actual laws or rules for living, which God gave to ancient Israel. Although the 5 books are very different, they tell of one story of God at work, not just in creation, but in calling of individuals and nations to obey him, thus bringing blessing to the whole world.
- 2) These books span about 800 years of Jewish history from roughly 1200-400 BC. They are an account of what happened from the time the Israelites conquered and settled their land of Canaan to the times of the judges and the kings where the nation was divided into 2 kingdoms: Israel to the north and Judah to the south. They describe the conquest of Israel by the Assyrians and the fall of Jerusalem, the destruction of the Jerusalem temple and subsequent exile of the Jews to Babylon.
- 3) Job, Proverbs and Ecclesiastes are specifically known as the Wisdom books. King Solomon, with his reputation for wisdom, is considered to be the author of Proverbs and Ecclesiastes. Job deals with the problem of physical and emotional suffering. The Psalms are a mixture of 150 prayers, hymns and poems many of which are attributed to King David. The Song of Songs is a collection of six songs on the theme of love between a young man and his bride.
- 4) These books are named after the prophet whose words they contain, with the exception of Lamentations. Jeremiah, Ezekiel and Daniel are known as major prophets and the other named books as the minor prophets.

In the next parish news and subsequent editions I will be commentating specifically on a book, starting of course, with Genesis. I hope that you will find my comments helpful and instructive .

Churchyard Regulations

The churchyards within the South Tamar Mission Community are maintained to be a place of peace, reflection and remembrance. To help us in this task we respectfully request:



- No artificial flowers or ornaments
- Fresh cut flowers to be placed in a receptacle for flowers on the stone base of the headstone. (Or they may be placed in a removable container (not glass) and sunk completely into the ground close to the headstone.) Flowers must be removed when they have withered, including those after burial.
- No planting of any kind, including bulbs, shrubs, plants and trees
- No containers or troughs with plants or flowers
- If there is no headstone, one removable, non glass container can be sunk into the ground adjacent to the memorial cross and used for cut flowers, as above.
- Remembrance Day poppies and Christmas wreaths must be removed before two months have elapsed.

Any vase, flowers, containers or wreaths and any other adornments not complying with the above rules may be removed by, or with the authority of, the Parish Priest.



A Story on the Theme of Courage

Fear is soft and smooth

Marina was extremely afraid of the dark. When the lights went out, everything and every shadow appeared to her as the most terrible of monsters. Her parents explained to her, every day and with great patience, that these things were not monsters. Marina understood her parents, but she could not stop feeling an awful fear whenever it was dark.



One day her Aunt Valerie came to visit. Valerie was an incredible woman. She was famous for her courage, and for having gone on many journeys of adventure, some of which had been made into books and movies. Marina wanted to conquer her fear of the dark, so she asked her Aunt how she became so brave, and whether she had ever been frightened.

"A great many times, Marina," answered her Aunt, "I remember when I was small and I was terribly afraid of the dark. I couldn't stay in the dark for even a moment".

Marina became very excited. How was it possible that someone so courageous could have been afraid of the dark?

"I'll tell you a secret, Marina. It was some blind children who taught me how to be brave. They can't see, so if they had never discovered the secret of how not to be afraid of the dark, they would have been forever frightened".

"It's true!" said Marina, intrigued, "Can you tell me that secret?"

"Of course! The secret is to change your eyes. Since blind children can't see, their hands are their eyes. All you have to do to conquer your fear is what they do. Shut the eyes of your face and open the eyes of your hands. Let's make a deal: tonight, when you go to bed and put out the light, if anything makes you afraid, close your eyes, carefully get out of bed, and try to see what it is that's making you scared. But do it using your hands as eyes... and tomorrow tell me how you're getting on with the fear".

Marina accepted, but she was rather worried. She knew she would need to be brave to close her eyes and go and touch whatever it was that was frightening her, but she was willing to try. When her parents took her to bed, she herself put out the light. After a little while, she felt afraid of



one of the shadows in the bedroom. Following the advice of Aunt Valerie, she closed the eyes of her face and opened the eyes of her hands. And, summoning up all her courage, she went over to touch that mysterious shadow...

The next morning Marina came running into the kitchen, a big smile on her face, and a song on her lips. "The monster is so soft and smooth!..." she cried, "It's my teddy bear!"

Foundation Course in Christian Ministry: South West Ministry Training Centre

Three people (Richard Searight, Mike and Annie Jefferies) from the South Tamar Mission Community are undertaking the 1 year Foundation Course based in Plymouth and Exeter. The course consists of 7 full day Study Days and the aims are to:

- to deepen your Christian discipleship
- to explore and help form your gifts for ministry
- to help you discern God's call for any future work within your Parish / Benefice / Mission Community.
- and to deepen your knowledge and understanding of The Bible, Theology, Spirituality and Pastoral Care.
- to grow in prayer.

The Study Days follow a similar pattern and are intended to take the students to a level equivalent of the first stage of a degree. Each Study Day involves a mixture of lectures and informal discussions on the core areas described in the aims, set within the context of worship at the beginning and end of the day. There are 26 people in the Group so there are good opportunities for socialising and informal discussion.

Each student is assigned a tutor who are members of the course teaching staff and each study day has a time allocated for tutor group work. This may include discussions on recommended reading material

A key element of the course is on reflection and to assist this the students are encouraged to keep a Journal for the year, documenting what has been learnt and experienced during the study days.

Similarly students are expected to join a local discussion group in their Benefice / Mission Community / Deanery. These groups may be using a particular course e.g. Pilgrim or Alpha, be a Bible Study group, or be exploring a locally chosen topic. These group sessions should take place no less than monthly. In the Autumn Term, the students are participating members of the Group , in the Lent term the students should each have an opportunity to lead the Group.

Students are encouraged to keep their Vicar involved with the developments of the course and the local congregations and PCC's of how the course is progressing, so that they can also offer support to their 3 students, which will be much appreciated.



Nature Notes by Bluebell - December 2017 - January 2018

"Art thou the bird whom man loves best, The pious bird with the scarlet breast, Our little English robin?" William Wordsworth

The robin in our gardens is the national bird and often seen now as the season grows colder. It has become a symbol of Christmas for a multitude of reasons. One is the red breast which reminded Victorians of the cheerful redjacketed postman who brought the Christmas mail; another is his apparent friendliness to people. The continental robin is shy in comparison, a woodland bird still. The English garden has provided a safe and rich habitat to tempt robins to closer friendship with us.

A robin has also, through this apparent friendship, been seen as a spirit Guide, sometimes, to humanity. A wonderful robin in "The Secret Garden " by Frances Hodgson Burnett, shows the children the way to the lost garden, like a paradise garden, and is their guide to growing health and happiness.

"Gard'ner Robin," (William Cowper), sitting on the spade handle, echoes the story of Adam and Eve, and Robin Hood, the woodlander, but there is also a

darker element to his mythic association:

"Who killed Cock Robin?"
"I," said the sparrow,
"With my bow and arrow,
I killed Cock Robin."

All the birds of the air fell a-sighing and a-sobbing When they heard of the death of poor Cock Robin.

Tommy Thumb's Pretty Song Book (c 1744)

One explanation of this old rhyme, with its distinctive cadences, is that Robin represents the death of the Celtic Sun god, Lugh, each winter. The Red Sun "coch rhi ben" is anglicised as cock robin. And the sparrow represents Bran, the god of winter, who kills the summer sun each year. There is also a nod to the old belief that souls became birds after death. "A Robin Redbreast in a Cage Puts all Heaven in a Rage." William Blake; Auguries of Innocence.

But Bluebell sees the little robin at her door as part of God's lovely world that we should care for and especially so at Christmas, as we look for the birth of the vulnerable baby Jesus.

GARDEN NOTES BY DOUG



Well, all seems quiet out there except for some rustling as the birds toss over leaves looking for morsels. We've had some frost and plenty of wind. The dahlias have finished but the chrysanthemums are still offering up the odd bloom for the vase. The tomato plants have long gone but some of the green fruits are still turning

red on the staging in the greenhouse. If you think now is the time to sit back in front of a warm fire with a glass of wine and a clutch of gardening catalogues, just remember: we should be busy out there. Weeds and grass still seem to grow. Borders need cutting back (although it's good to leave some for the wild life), leaves need collecting and bagging for leaf mould, gutters need clearing, greenhouse glass needs cleaning, Acers (and others) need pruning.

Doug's decided to move some roses and plant some replacements. Three have not thrived in their current spot although a fourth has done really well. So, three are moving to other places in the garden and three bare root ones of the successful type have been ordered. It's a good time too for moving border perennials around. It is also a good time to do those landscaping jobs — the stones, bricks, chippings, paving, drainage jobs which just never seem worth it in the summer but you know it'd be good to have done.

One big success has been my scented pelargonium which has lovely bright vibrant mauve flowers flushed with dark centres. Regularly deadheaded, it has flowered profusely all spring/summer/autumn having survived last winter with little protection. In fact, it's ignored the recent frosts and is still continuing to flower – see photo taken today – mid November. (Dear Ed, Pity we don't have colour in the magazine!) I've got cuttings under protection, so we'll see what happens to the parent over winter - perhaps in the unheated greenhouse. A similar stunningly vibrant plant at this time of year is the Tibouchina with its rich violet-purple flowers. You might have seen it at Cotehele alongside the barn.

Time for making joyous Christmas wreaths for the door. Doug likes the one on



the cover of a supermarket brochure made mostly of Brussel Sprouts. It looks lovely. Presumably, you chuck it in a pan of boiling water as the turkey is resting. Very good.

Basil of the Bushveld - memories of life in S. Africa

Ann and I were farming in the North of Rhodesia, in a District called Umvukwes (means 'place to wake up'). One day we heard a small motorbike coming down the farm road Through the African bush. Not knowing what to expect, we went out to behold the sight of Father Basil French, our rather large and elderly parish Vicar, doing his rounds on his Honda 70 mini motorbike. Basil's parish was sixty miles across and forty miles deep, and due to sanctions and petrol rationing, he used his Honda to get around. It was quite a sight to see Basil who was quite a large chap on his small motorbike in his full Vicar's cassocks. As usual on our remote farms visitors were always welcome, so it was onto the veranda and tea was served. Basil gave us all the Parish and village news, and forthcoming events.

That was only half the story. At the time there was a nasty terrorist civil war going on, so any of the dirt roads Basil used were subject to landmines and terrorist ambushes, but Basil it seemed had a charmed life. He eventually retired in his dotage to Wells Cathedral we think.

All of the farmers in his extensive Parish stayed on their farms throughout that war. We had a responsibility to our mainly African staff, and to grow food, and economy, for the nation, besides protecting our staff, and our neighbours, be they African or European. Basil had a great responsibility, as many of our farms and the African villages were attacked, usually by night with hit and run tactics, by Mr Mugabe's so called freedom fighters (freedom for whom), thus there were many deaths and casualties. Basil French did great work with the families of the bereaved, and all who were affected.

Christmas time, Basil used to organise Christmas carol services at particularly easy access farms, that we all looked forward to, having a community party after the service and all ending up staying the night, to avoid travel in the dark. The men folk who were all paramilitary trained, would take turns guarding the perimeter, so everybody, particularly the kids, could have a good time without worry. At one service and party, we were lucky to have an Army section of young "Troopies" to guard us, who were generously plied with home-made mince pies and trifle, plus the odd beer, when the CSM was not watching. Basil worked his parish through all of this, doing weddings, christenings and other Parish work. Always with a smile . He was a much appreciated man and Vicar, and a vital part of the community.



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
