The Two Old Testament Book of Kings

by lan Silcox Like the books of Samuel and Chronicles the book of Kings was originally one book, but divided into two by the Greek translators. The period covered is about 400 years roughly 975



-586 BC and is an account of Israel's history. The death of King David through the division that followed King Solomon's death to the fall of Jerusalem and the destruction of the temple by the Babylonians

The first book starts with the death of King David and the accession of his son Solomon, the third and last King of the united Israel; a reign that was to be for some 40 years It was considered to be the golden age in Israel's history with the temple built by Solomon in Jerusalem becoming the centre of the life and worship of the nation.

Solomon at Gibeon ,a city of Benjamin, on being asked by God in a vision what he wanted from him replied choosing wisdom and understanding - Chapter 3 verses 4/10-consequently being given riches and honour. His wealth was legendary being referred by Christ in its comparison with the lilies *'..that neither spin nor weave but I tell you in all his splendour Solomon was not attired like one of these..'*-Luke12:27/28 also Matthew 6:28-.

Solomon's wisdom is expressed in Old Testament books of the Song of Songs; Proverbs and Ecclesiastes also indirectly in Psalms 72 and 127. This first book tends to give emphasis to kings, who either were particularly faithful to the covenant –i.e. God's promise and call made at Sinai mediated by Moses for the nation's obedience, or who had deviated from it. The figure of Ahab is of particular importance by a reign by violations of the covenant often arising through the influence of his pagan's wife Jezebel. The prophet Elijah is significant as a model of a faithful prophet working under very difficult circumstances.

The second book in its first 13 chapters is primarily about the ministry of the prophet Elisha –the successor to Elijah-2: 15. The book continues with the gradual decline of the kingdoms of Judah , formed from the tribes of Judah and Benjamin, and Israel of the remaining 12 tribes. Chapter 17 records the defeat of Israel by the Assyrians and the assimilation of its people into the Assyrian empire. The final defeat of the nation of Judah is detailed in chapter 25 by the Babylonians with the destruction of the Jerusalem temple followed by the deportation of into exile her king Zedekiah and most of the people to Babylon and other regions of its empire

So what is the lesson for us today from these two books of Kings? I would say to maintain faithfulness, honour and loyalty to God as a nation and its rulers for which we are blessed in the deep Christian faith of our present Queen

The Snowdrop; Consolation by Bishop Keble 1792-1886

As I write this, only two weeks in to the New Year, my sister-in-law has already shared a photograph on Facebook of Snow Drops in full bloom. Yesterday from the Vicarage window, I saw two Rooks so intent on establishing territory, that we nearly had a head on collision. I woke this morning to bird song, and it won't be too soon before we see the first Daffodil in bud. These are each little things, but like this quotation by Bishop Keble, they bring hope in the midst of dark days, even when it seems like winter will never end.

This coming December I will have been with you all for 5 years; it has been a precious time, rich in experience and at times deeply challenging. I will always be grateful to you for your welcome, friendship, and to those of you who support me in prayer. Over these four years I have become increasingly aware of the Deacon's call to look out and to serve the community. On rereading the words of the Ordination service, I am reminded that this is not only my call but yours too, for together we are all called to seek out the poor and weak, the sick and lonely and those who are oppressed and powerless, in order that we might make the love of God visible. I do not think that this is necessarily always about grand projects but consider the delicate snowdrop, the brightness of a daffodil trumpet, and the beauty of simple bird song as a model for mission. It is often the small things that speak of the love of God to people. It is often through these small things that we may follow our Bishops vision to *Grow in Prayer*, to *Make New Disciples* and to *Serve the People of Devon with Joy*.

Over the Lenten period we have the opportunity to consider how we might show God's love through our Lent Course "*Another Story Must Begin*", details can be found in side this issue of the magazine. Come me along and reflect with me how we can be part of making God's love visible in our world. With every Blessing,



The following Sunday the whole team took part in the Carol Service at St. Peter's Church, Lamerton, playing solo items but also playing with the organist for 2 congregational carols. LAMERTON CHURCHBELL RINGING TRIP NICOLA'S CHRISTMAS CRACKER

When Nicola Blowey, one of our leading young ringers, left for Harper Adams University a few year ago, Bill, her father, arranged some evening churchbell ringing with a meal to bid her "bon voyage". So successful was that post Christmas Trip that it has now become an annual event held on the first Saturday in January.

This year 4 church towers were booked and an evening meal arranged for January 5th. The first church was St. Mary's in Callington, where we were treated to some wonderful ringing on this outstanding ring of 8 bells cast by Taylors of Loughborough in 1975. 19 of us had gathered by that time as we then made our way to St. Dominick. The church of St. Dominica possesses a ring of 6 bells installed in 1966 again by Taylors. The bells are quite old having been cast by John Pennington in 1773.

We then moved on to St. Mellion where the 6 bells were soon sounding out to some well struck call changes which is very much Lamerton's style. Interestingly, 2 of the bells in this tower were cast by William Pannell in 1831. Pannells cast the original 6 bells that were destroyed in The Great Fire at Lamerton in 1877. The final tower was the Church of St. Odulph, Pillaton. Here the church possesses a superb ring of 8 bells that replaced an old 6 that had been cast by a variety of Founders. Some superb ringing concluded the day after which we made our way to The Rifle Volunteer at St. Ann's Chapel for a roast dinner together.

Eight years ago Bluebell was surrounded by deep snow in Chillaton and unable to drive out, but the mist and soft rain lies silvering the grass this January and even the moles are active, for it is mild. Mole activity at Candlemas on 2^{nd}

February is supposed to predict harsh weather to come. Bluebell watches the pale winter dawn rise over Dartmoor through the black leaf-less twigs of trees.

Snowdrops are opening in the misty morning, and a few primroses, tucked in sheltered corners, and Bluebell has seen a blue periwinkle in flower.

Robins are singing and the little wren rings his noisy warning note from deep in the brown bracken on the forest floor.

The woods and fields are waiting quietly for Spring. But not all is quiet. Suddenly a jay, flashing pink wings and brilliant white rump, sweeps through the trees with a harsh call. The blackbirds on the lawn scatter. There are a lot of them, local ones joined by over-wintering strangers from the continent, who came with the fieldfares and redwings.

Blackbirds are feasting on the remains of Bluebell's apples. The crop was abundant this year, and she enjoys turning and throwing out the few which are starting to rot each week from her store, for the birds.

On February 14th comes St Valentine's Day. St Valentine was a priest martyred in 269AD, in Rome. He is the patron saint of happy marriages, love, epilepsy and bee-keepers. Some believe his feast has taken over the old Fertility Feast of Lupercalia, celebrating the marriage of Zeus, King of the gods, and Hera, his queen.

The woods are lovely, dark and deep, But I have promises to keep, And miles to go before I sleep, And miles to go before I sleep."



Well, Happy New Year and let's hope the daffodils come soon to lift our spirits. The snowdrops are already looking lovely; I just wish I had more of them, enough to cut for the house.

Lamerton Parish Neighbourhood Plan

For those residents of Lamerton Parish, you should, by now, have received a mailed letter from the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group notifying you of the release of our draft Plan which we strongly encourage you to look at, since it will have an impact on the way our Parish village develop over the coming years.

It is still referred to as 'Draft Plan' simply because you will ultimately have the opportunity to either accept it as it is, or to propose any constructive changes that might make it more effective and workable prior to its submission for approval and acceptance by the authorities.

By the time you read this, you will have already had that opportunity to view the Plan either on the website (<u>www.lamertonparish.co.uk</u>) or the numerous hard copies spread strategically around the area in local businesses, offices etc.

We have set up some 'Drop-in' sessions at the Village Hall which will be manned by Steering Group members who will be available to answer any questions you may have and to listen to any suggestions you feel could be included in the Plan. These will be between 7pm - 9pm on the following dates:

- Tuesday January 29th and Thursday January 31st
- Tuesday February 12th and Thursday February 14th

However, the next crucial step is where you can help the Plan become a reality. This will come when WDBC send you a referendum voting slip, whereby your positive vote will help to achieve this and the Plan can (upon approval by the Government Planning Inspectorate) become a statutory document to help control unwanted building development, improve facilities and services for the benefit of all. This will still be several months away since the Consultation process is not a quick one!

We continue to emphasize the reality that 'with an approved Plan, our Parish will always have a say in its future and a seat at the table whereas, without one, we will have no say and always end up with what we are given by others'. Simply put, this means that if this Plan is not approved by residents in the forthcoming WDBC referendum, any site within our Parish becomes 'fair game' for developers, against whom we would have little defence.

By completing your voting card when it arrives and returning it to approve and accept the Plan, you will have played a major part in helping to secure the Parish future.
