To my Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As I sit to write this letter, I am conscious that we are now fast approaching Easter. (Although, this may be the first Easter where will need an Ark!) Easter is about new starts, new life, new birth. This is often symbolised with images of eggs and chicks. We give and receive Easter eggs and maybe cards with pictures of spring sunshine or newborn chicks. But Easter isn't really about eggs or chicks. It's about Jesus!

The real reason that we think about new life at Easter is because Jesus, who was crucified on that first Good Friday, rose to new life on the first Easter Sunday. This is not just a wonderful story, it's an historical fact. Jesus' body was never found, and his resurrection never disproved. This was despite the best efforts of the mighty Roman Empire and the committed and powerful Jewish leaders to destroy the early church and discredit their belief. The early disciples were changed from a frightened and disillusioned group to men who stood up against the authorities and eventually gave their lives for what they believed – for what they knew to be true –

that Jesus came back to life on Easter Sunday. New life for Jesus leading to new life in his disciples. New starts that make my recent changes seem trivial!

The impacts of what happened that first Easter are still relevant today. When Jesus died and rose, he did it for us. He offers us new life, eternal life, with him; life that starts now, but continues beyond this life. Now that is worth celebrating!

I hope you all had a wonderful Easter. I hope you spent some time thinking about the real meaning of Easter: Jesus' resurrection.


After the success of the Warm Hub, several people wished to carry on meeting and wanted more people to come along too, so we have relaunched as Coffee & Company.

Differences between Prophecy and Prediction

Differences between *Prophecy* and *Prediction* can be subtle. Generally, prophecy is a foretelling that does not have any apparent reasoned basis. *Predictions* are based on logical foundations. However, it would have been hard for the people of the 1960s to imagine that within 60 years a small portable device would enable anyone to speak and see anyone anywhere in the world, answer almost any question and translate languages into their own language. This would have sounded prophetic but it was in fact a *prediction*. Smartphones are now part of our everyday reality. Once radio transmissions and silicon chips had been invented

farsighted people could have predicted that smartphones would come to pass.

Equally, looking forward, it might now be rational to *predict* the advent of world peace by 2100. However, this will come to pass simply because mature 21st Century's nations don't go to war with each other. Even up to the 18th and 19th centuries great nations were still building empires. However, it is now inconceivable for developed nations to launch colonial wars or claim foreign lands by force. We look at 19th Century nations like China and Russia with despair and disdain. However, the far sighted will observe that while the birth pangs of democracy and free speech are painful, they eventually produced the free world an increasing proportion of nations now enjoy. In time expansionist totalitarian regimes are replaced or die out. Dictatorships die when their dictators die or are replaced. The will of the people does eventually prevail – especially when surrounded by the example of free, prosperous and democratic nations. It is therefore rational to predict that World Peace is inevitable - if not imminent!

Turning to *prophesy* we can observe that Our Lord's track record was extraordinary. His prophecies included the manner of his execution, his resurrection - and later the fall of Jerusalem and the destruction of the temple in 70 CE. Currently we are waiting for the fulfilment of his prophecy of the second coming and of its world changing effect. Interestingly we predict that the latter will be fulfilled as current technology will allow us all to see and hear everything the future Messiah says and does. It all will be brought live into our own sitting rooms on a daily basis! This will certainly change the world.

We can therefore confidently *predict* that the second coming will be a world changing event – as Our Lord *prophesied*.

St Andrew's, Coryton is part of a group of local churches which participate in the annual World Day of Prayer held each year on the first Friday in March. WDP is an international, inter-church organisation, celebrated in over 170 countries, led by women. It enables the thoughts of women from all parts of the world, their hopes, concerns, and prayers to be heard. Each year women from a different

country prepare the order of worship.

This year the Christian Women of Palestine called us to connect with the land where Jesus was born, ministered and died - and where our faith began. The theme of the service was "I beg you, bear with one another in love".

The churches in the local group take it in turn to host the service; this year it was held in Stowford. It will be Corvton's turn in 2027.

A CHILD'S FOOTSTEPS TO FAITH

A Day to Remember

Finally, the Bible tells us that they knew the Holy Spirit was there because they could feel his power. When they were filled with the Holy Spirit, he gave them

Walk One 17th February Marystowe to Coryton

As we had our halfway stop it was a relief to realise most of the uphill section was complete (according to the APP we climbed the equivalent of 24 flights of stairs on the first half of our walk, and just 2 on the second half). Watching the dogs playing and running around as we walked through the fields was lovely.




William was intrigued and asked George, "After I slapped you, you wrote in the sand, and now you have written on a stone. Why?"



NATURE NOTES BY BLUEBELL April - May 2024



Nothing I cared, in the lamb white days, that time would take me Up to the swallow thronged loft by the shadow of my hand, In the moon that is always rising, ...

Oh as I was young and easy in the mercy of his means, Time held me green and dying Though I sang in my chains like the sea. Dylan Thomas "Fern Hill" 1946

Spring, April and May, in the West country, as the wild flowers and trees blossom in fields and lanes, orchards, woods and hedgerows, is a lovely time, fit to lift the heart and fill Bluebell with praise to our Creator!

I watched her secret toil from day to day How true she warped the moss to form a nest, And modelled it within with wood and clay. John Clare "The Thrush's Nest"

The blackbird, like the thrush, makes a cup-shaped nest, woven of twigs and grasses, bark, moss, and anything to hand like binder twine and feathers. It is lined with soft grass and smooth mud. The nest takes about two weeks to construct and is very strong. It has to be, because blackbirds usually build their nests in hedges, shrubs and bushes, and they need protection from predators. The hen bird does the building. The nestlings can fly and leave the nest only 12 to 14 days after hatching. The adult pair may raise several broods in one season. They seldom return to the same nest the next year.

Hedges are so important to nesting birds, and also to hibernating and nesting hazel dormice. 'A survey by the UK Centre for Ecology and Hydrology has revealed that England has 390,000km of hedgerows, enough to circle the world almost ten times.' They could be wider, with more tall standard trees left in them to be more use for nature and carbon capture. *Jonathan Tulloch, The Times February16th 2024.*

The Government has promised to restore the ban, which has lapsed, on cutting hedgerows between March 1st and August 31st, but there is no date yet to reintroduce the law, supported by Wildlife Trusts, the RSPB, and BTO. Hedgerows provide essential habitat for nesting birds and safe passageways between woodlands. 'Vital for wildlife, hedgerows help make farming more resilient to the extreme wet and dry of climate change, keeping soil in the field and out of rivers, and shading livestock in our increasingly severe summer heat.' *Tom Lancaster, Energy and Climate Intelligence Unit, The Times, March* 5th 2024.
