Questions in Faith

Can we really prove that God exists - rationally?

Initially I thought this would be a 'Paygrade' issue. Proving a reality beyond our own reality sounds way too much. Personally, I don't do the shock and awe thing - that God *must* exist because the universe is so mind numbingly enormous. More at my level is the fact that God has been both *seen* and *experienced* by saints for millennia. Surely, we need their evidence for the case for God to become convincing. Let us apply Wesley's



for God to become convincing. Let us apply Wesley's Quadrilateral – Scripture, Tradition, Reason and Experience!

Scripture records numerous miraculous events like a virgin birth, a resurrection – in short, an existence outside our existence. In fact, to be a prophet within the Judaic traditions they *had* to demonstrate 'signs' of operating beyond our physical reality. For instance, all four Gospels record that our Lord could heal the sick, raise the dead, feed thousands of people - twice! These events were of course witnessed by many

Tradition – Currently are 2.3 billion Christians seeking and finding God. The Bible continues the world's bestselling book and has been for two millennial

Reason – If you asked an educated person whether they believed in 'black holes' they would think you strange – or simply ignorant. We can't see black holes because visible light can never escape from them - yet we 'believe' in them because there is so much evidence for them. Stephen Hawkins did the maths and astronomers have verified it using the evidence black holes have on the space around them. The evidence for the existence of God can be found in both 'signs' (miracles) and in the effect of divinely inspired teaching on our lives and the lives of saints.

Experience – God is a personal force that we experience. Any practitioner of religion will tell you that the real, life changing evidence for God is a combination both of 'His signs' and their personal experience of God. These generate faith. Individually we have to believe the rationale of the Bible if we are to get close enough to the divine experience which proves the existence of God. A foot soldier's paygrade is enough to be a part of a winning army. They don't need the knowledge or experience of the general's paygrade. However together they both win the divine battle and both become part of the evidence for God.

Sadly, since the last magazine entry, one of our dearly loved parishioners, Reg Barns, has passed away. Reg was over ninety and moved down from London to Sydenham Damerel many years ago with his wife, Eleanor. They loved living here and were very much part of our community. Reg's beloved Eleanor died some years ago but Reg, always active, cheerful and on-the-ball continued to join in with village life. He will be missed by our whole community. A 'Remembering Reg' service was held in St. Mary's where, notwithstanding the pandemic, over 40 villagers joined together. Close to £400 was raised for the Derriford Hospital's Chestnut Appeal for prostate cancer; something we know Reg would have approved of.

New Anna Chaplains Commissioned

Sunday 7th November marked the culmination of a pilot project to roll out the work of Anna Chaplaincy in the Archdeaconry of Plymouth. Six Anna Chaplains and two Anna Friends were commissioned during a service at the Church of the Holy Spirit, Southway in Plymouth, led by the Archdeacon, the Ven. Nick Shutt. Two of the new Anna Chaplains are Annie Jefferies from Lamerton and Josie Whitfield from Coryton.

Anna Chaplains are named after the widow, Anna, who appears with Simeon in Luke's gospel; both are good role models of faithful older people. Anna Chaplaincy is an ecumenical, community-based, chaplaincy promoting the spiritual welfare of older people. Anna Chaplaincy is a person-centred and non-judgemental ministry for people of strong, little or no faith at all. The chaplaincy is intended to complement and run alongside, rather than replicating or replacing, ministry already being done by churches as well as services to the elderly provided by community or secular organisations.

The names of those being commissioned were read out and together they declared that they believed that God was calling them to this service. They pledged, with the support and prayers of the congregation, to prayerfully perform their work and to develop the gifts given to them by God as they share in Christ's mission and ministry.

A letter of support from the BRF Anna Chaplaincy Team was presented and then refreshments were served and the newly commissioned Chaplains and Friends had an opportunity to get to know each other better.

One of the joys of the day was finally seeing each other face to face. Due to the various lockdowns, the pilot project meetings had been conducted on ZOOM



as had the online training so a number of remarks along the lines of 'you're a lot taller than you appeared on ZOOM' were overheard.

The newly commissioned Chaplains and Friends are now back in their various corners of the Archdeaconry, hard at work. A number of others are in various stages of training and the plan is for another commissioning service to be held in the Spring, this time in Exeter with Bishop Robert officiating.

NATURE NOTES BY BLUEBELL



"Hark! Hark! The lark at heaven's gate sings,": Cymbeline 11 iii; W Shakespeare

There are some large flocks of winter thrushes, (fieldfares and redwing), of starlings, and sanderling about, on the moors and farmland this winter, and Bluebell has disturbed a single lark which rose from the grass and

hesitantly sang. Larks here in winter are few now, but there used to be hundreds and hundreds of thousands. They would turn the sky dark for several days as they flew in in huge flocks, called exaltations or bevys, day and night, calling and singing, from Europe in the Autumn.

Skylarks were caught with nets or mirrors for meat (females), and to be caged singing birds (males) in huge quantities in the 19th Century in England. In the 1890's as many as 40,000 skylarks were sold in the London meat markets per day! Horrible! "Over a million British larks went to the Dieppe Market in 1867-8, and a similar amount to Les Halles, Paris." William Henry Hudson was one of the reformers who founded the SPB, which became the RSPB, in 1891 to save the little skylarks.

But worse was to come, and numbers have plummeted in England by 24% between 1995 and 2013. They are farmland specialists and are vulnerable to changes in farming practice such as additional cuts of silage which are now commonplace. Larks nest on the ground, in furrows or just a hoof print depression. They like stubble crops and ground cover.

The RSPB, Game & Wildlife Conservation Trust, and DEFRA suggest adapting areas such as introducing buffer strips and Skylark plots.

The song of the skylark has been such an inspiration to musicians and poets. 'The Lark Ascending', by Ralph Vaughan Williams, inspired by George Meredith's poem, is one of our most popular, best loved pieces of music: "A song of light…to reach the shining tops of day,".

John Clare wrote of the "Sweet minstrel of the farm and plough..." "For God loves little larks as well As man or beast.". 'To a Lark Singing in Winter.'

GARDEN NOTES BY DOUG



Well, in Doug's patch the fungi are mushrooming! Lots of 'em. I guess it's the warm wet weather we've had or, perhaps they've decided to pop their heads up and have a look around at what the 'overground folk' are up to? Global warming? Apparently there are some 15,000 species of fungi to be found in the UK. Doug saw 3 the other day (see photograph below), but couldn't name all

of these let alone the remaining 14,997! Some are poisonous - and look it. Others are - but look like they want to go home with you and be 'mushrooms on toast'. Of course, we only think of them when we see them, but they are there all year quietly getting on with their work, a vast network of underground connections reaching out in all directions looking for something to nibble or talk with. We don't give them enough respect.

If you have dahlias, you will have decided by now whether to lift them. I've lifted some and the tubers are resting in the greenhouse. Others I'm leaving in the ground and I'm confident they'll survive and thrive. I was surprised recently to hear that you can eat them! They're like potatoes - the tubers! Dahlia chips anyone?

I've said it before, but now is a great time to buy roses, bare root roses, not those in pots. Bare root ones are asleep and if you plant them now (or soon) they'll be with you for years. Easy!

If you've got fruit trees, shrubs or bushes out there, now is time to prune although some fruits are better done in summer because of viruses; for

example, plums which are prone to silver leaf disease. Ah, I shouldn't have done mine last winter!

Cut bits of greenery and put in a vase - you'll be surprised how good a few boring bits from out there can look when they're brought inside! Go on, just cut some - holly, ivy, anything in leaf, or seed heads on stems. Make it a mix. Pop in a vase. Lovely.

Relax and prepare for the new gardening year. Enjoy thinking of what is to come! Good luck!

"Spring Forward and Fall Back"

There's another old saying that sums up the spring and autumn seasons. You lose an hour in the spring and gain one in the autumn. But is does not work like that and by late afternoon now it's usually dark. By 4:30pm I'm certainly not convinced I've gained an hour of daylight, still perhaps I'll find it again come summer time.

Thank goodness for the electricity in the covered yards. Returning cows to their warm winter housing brings a whole host of things to think through. Firstly, it must be clean, cattle housed in a clean barn will reduce bacteria levels, prevention is better than cure and it is important that beds are kept clean and dry to encourage healthy winter housing periods. The family have all been hard at work pressure washing and disinfecting ready for the suckler cows and calves to come in however, at the time of writing we're not quite there yet and with the price of straw this year 'tis no bad thing!


The maize crop has been harvested and winter corn tilled and coming up nicely. There have been a few problems this autumn with 'leather jackets' and other insects eating the new shoots of corn as they appear. Also birds, mainly rooks, pitching into the grass fields, particularly older leys, digging up the turfs to find leather jackets etc - all making a real mess! It all depends on the season and this autumn has been particularly warm and moist for insects to thrive however, I suspect the chain harrows and roller will be well used next spring as a result.

The rams have been in with their 'ladies' for some time working away, hopefully bringing a good crop of lambs from early December onwards. Hayseed has been feeding silage for a while now, the quality and quantity is pretty good this year, lets hope there will be enough to carry through until next April/May when the cows return to pasture

By the time this 'ditty' is printed winter will be almost upon us once more and the constant everyday routines will be in full swing - fingers crossed for a trouble free time. With best wishes for Christmas and the new year.

LAMERTON SPEED WATCH

The team have been operating for just about twelve months. Some of you may have noticed us with our Police Radar Gun and yellow hi-vis vests checking on vehicles passing through the village.

From the 18th of November 2020 to the 12th of November 2021, we have held 94 sessions and recorded 507 vehicles exceeding the speed limit, with the maximum of 56mph (+86%) in the 30mph limit. 402 letters have been sent out and of persistent offenders, 34 have been sent a second letter and 8 have been sent a third letter and amongst that number 14 had no Tax, MOT or registered as SORN.

So far we think it has been a worthwhile activity but two of our original team have now moved away and we would love to have new members to join us. If you are interested, please contact me:

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
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
