Dear Friends,

Happy New Year to you all! I hope that you have been able to find some rest from all the busyness of Christmas and are finding a peaceful rhythm for this new season.

Lent is a season of reconciliation, of preparation, and of discipline. In keeping with those themes, we have a Lent Course which looks to explore how we can be part of a thriving church in a multi-parish context.

The Thrive Course from CPAS has very good reviews and a proven track record on supporting new life and growth in churches, so we hope you will join us for the course, which will start on 20th February (see magazine advert for details).

To mark the start of Lent itself, we will be holding an Ash Wednesday service of Holy Communion at St Peter's, Lamerton, at 10am.

As with previous years, this service will involve the imposition of ashes where, if you choose, you may come forward to receive the

sign of the cross in the ashes created from the burning of last year's palm crosses. This is an outward sign of our inward repentance and a symbol of our commitment to Jesus Christ.

Easter just makes it into March in our calendar this year, so it is my pleasure to share this letter with you for both Lent and Easter.

In my Christmas addresses at Dunterton and Marystowe, I spoke of how the Nativity story of a birth in a stable is a charming one, but as a story alone it offers little sense of "why", that might explain why it is still being celebrated 2,000 years later by millions of people. Any decent writer will tell you that a complete story requires a beginning, a middle and an end, and truly Christmas is just the beginning, not a story in itself. Through Epiphany, we start to see the middle unfold as Jesus is baptised, receives the Holy Spirit and begins His earthly ministry, and we try to unpack His teachings and disciplines for ourselves through Lent. Holy Week, from Palm Sunday onwards, is the beginning of the end, as we journey with Jesus to the Cross on Good Friday. Then the cliffhanger, the suspense, of Easter Saturday; the world paused in disbelief that the Messiah should be dead... But finally, the truly wonderful ending to the greatest story ever told - on Easter Day the cry rings out of "Alleluia!" as we celebrate the risen Christ. I do hope that you will turn the pages with us, as we go through this season in our churches together, proclaiming the Good News once more.

A CHILD'S FOOTSTEPS TO FAITH

Spring Cleaning

Spring is such a wonderful time of the year. The temperature begins to warm and the world begins to take on a fresh new look. The trees start to put on leaves, the grass begins to turn green, and the flowers start to bloom. Everything is beautiful! There are other things that tell us that spring is here too. For one thing, many people have started their spring cleaning.

Spring is a good time to give your house a good going over and clean everything up and get rid of a lot of junk that you don't need.

This is a story about a time when Jesus did some spring cleaning. It was time for the annual Passover celebration, so Jesus travelled to Jerusalem. When he arrived in Jerusalem, Jesus went to the temple. He couldn't believe his eyes. There in the temple area he saw people who were selling cattle, sheep, and doves for the people to use as sacrifices in the temple. There were tables set up for money changers so that people could change their money to pay their temple taxes. It looked more like a carnival than a house of worship.

Jesus did not like what he saw. He was so angry that he made a whip from some rope and he drove the cattle and sheep and those who were selling them from the temple. He went to the tables of the money changers and turned them over, scattering coins all

It is a time to look inside ourselves and see if there is anything in us that needs to be changed. Are there some areas of our lives where Jesus needs to do some 'spring cleaning'?

Dear Jesus, during this time when we think of 'spring cleaning', we ask you to forgive us when we do wrong and to make us clean. Amen.

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A Story on the Theme of Forgiveness

Sold for over £20 but just under £30



Although there are quite a few versions of this book available, our copy had some rarity value.

We were given a box of children's books and by sorting through we grouped them by series and nine of the Ladybird books sold for just over £25.

However, there are not many thrills. Except for when you go through a bag of books left in the Church and find worn and battered but a FIRST EDITION! Being donated a set of books is great, it is true that the sum of the parts is less than the whole...

This was one of the earliest eBay sales and the bidding was ferocious. The book had been with the Church for a while and, because of Lockdown, we began sorting out, and found this gem.



Please can we give a big thank you to everyone who donates books to Marystowe and reassure them that if they are not on the shelves when you pop in then they have either been sold already, passed to a Charity Shop, or perhaps produced a result for us on eBay.

A note of caution please – do not stop giving your books to us and image making enough money for a Caribbean Cruise through eBay – we have listed hundreds of items and only 1 in 4 sells, and the average price is just over $\pounds 5$.

In Spring 2021 we moved our crates of books and puzzles into the Bell Tower at Marystowe. We have raised over £3,000 for the Church and hopefully given lots of pleasure to bookworms.

We do want to continue with the bookshop being so well used, and we have therefore embarked on a thorough review of the stock to make sure that there is a good turnover of titles, and it is easy to browse the shelves.

What's Changed? The books will be more clearly labelled with more space. We are going to be more disciplined in reviewing the stock to make sure new titles are clearly displayed; so, it is always worth a visit to be tempted for another book.

In addition, we are removing any books that look tired and damaged, this will give more space to ensure the stock remains in good condition. All surplus books are being donated to charity shops locally.

What's New? There will be a small table in the Bell Tower, changed regularly, to show recent arrivals and old favourites that we think deserve a good read.

We are also going to highlight some books that we have especially enjoyed reading and ask other readers to provide short reviews. We can then share the enthusiasm for great stories and authors. If you are donating (or returning) books to Marystowe that you have really enjoyed, please do think about letting us have a couple of sentences on the story or the author.

Can we still have Potluck reads?

Absolutely yes...if you are not a member then a quick reminder:

Every month you get a book selected for you from the bell tower. This will follow your broad preferences and, if you are local, be delivered to you. We do also choose books and send to people further afield, however a charge is made for postage. The cost is £10 for a year.

How much are the books? We ask for a minimum donation of 50p per paperback and £1 for hardbacks. There is an honestly jar in the bell tower.

NATURE NOTES BY BLUEBELL



The north wind doth blow, And we shall have snow, And what will poor robin do then? Poor thing!

In this weather it is hard to trust that spring will come with Easter too, at the end of March. Bluebell finds that an open fire and looking at pictures of spring flowers, in magazines and seed catalogues is a good way to cheer herself up in the dark days of winter. Hope springs from the sight of the first snowdrops, celandines, primroses and daffodils. The sun in winter casts long dark shadows from trees and hedgerows over the fields, even in the middle of the day.

A sign! Hope! Renewal! At harvest time last autumn, a little roe buck that Bluebell had been watching, covertly, all summer, was killed, probably running away from the combine harvester, in its haste and fear unable to jump through the hedge and bank with barbed wire. Its separated bones are still scattered at the field edge, its little skull half buried in the mud.

A few days ago, coming quietly round the corner of the same field, Bluebell surprised a new roe deer, (they are somehow always unexpected), in the middle of the field. It raised its head to look at her, then "jumped away on spring-loaded legs, like antelopes on the African savannah. This strange habit is known as stotting, from a Scots term meaning 'walk with a bounce'." As it departs the white patch on its backside shines like a beacon in the dim light of this dull winter's afternoon. [Wonderland, p58; Brett Westwood & Stephen Moss]. Bluebell cannot help but find her heart lifted by the sight, as if it were a Resurrection symbol of new life after death.

At the edge of the same field Bluebell surprised a fine fox, black tip to his tail, white chest, red-gold fur shining in the winter sun. In Farnham, at Christmas, Bluebell saw foxes almost every night in the street or gardens. They scramble over six foot fences, and the wild mating call of the Vixen can be heard.

In the Twelve Days of Christmas Carol, Bluebell was charmed to learn that the 'four calling birds' was originally 'four Colley birds'. Colley is an archaic West Country term for the colour black. It derives from the word 'coaly' meaning 'coal-coloured', and is sometimes spelt 'collie', as in the black (and white) dog of the same name. So colly bird simply means the blackbird. Another old name for the blackbird is ousel or ouzel, "The woosell cocke, so black of hew, with orange-tawny bill" [*Midsummer Night's Dream; W Shakespeare, (The Twelve Birds of Christmas; Stephen Moss)*.]

RECRUITMENT OF ANNA CHAPLAINS AND ANNA FRIENDS....

Anna Chaplains offer spiritual support to older people, wherever they may live, in their own homes , in care settings or for people living in sheltered accommodation.

Another way of describing this work is akin to giving pastoral care support. Anna Chaplaincy has a training built in (paid for by Exeter Diocese) which covers all skills required to be a volunteer chaplain. This includes, listening skills, learning in more details about the ageing process and talking through issues such as dementia management.

Rev'd Andy our local incumbent is very positive about this model of giving spiritual support, and would happily have a conversation with anyone who is

interested in working more closely with elderly people.

The number of hours that you commit is entirely dependent on your availability. Anna Chaplains usually commit to 1-2 days a month, although when you make visits is based on your own diary flexibility. Anna Friends who support the Chaplains doing very similar work, usually have less time available, and may find

that 1/2 day a month is sufficient time to still be of value in offering spiritual.

support to local people.
