### **Questions in Faith**



When our Lord cursed the fig Tree (Mark 11:12-25 & 22-24) it was evidence of the physical effects of faith. We cannot explain either Faith or the power of the Holy Spirit. We can only witness or observe their effects - or the results. Just as we can only see 5% of the known universe, we know that 95% is not visible to us by the effects it has on what we can see.

Whenever I get stuck or find the Bible hard to believe I go back to the facts – things we know for certain. For instance, we know for certain that the Israelites were enslaved in Egypt for 400 years. We know for certain that they left Egypt. We know for certain that they passed through the Red Sea. We know that the Egyptians did not pass through the Red Sea. Therefore, the Red Sea parted. Equally we know several 100,000 Israelites survived in the desert for 40 years. They would have to be fed by manna because there was nothing else to eat! Therefore, manna existed – by faith. Equally we know that our Lord raised the dead twice and fed 1000s of people twice because thousands of people witnessed these events. We know He caused a fig tree to whither because it was witnessed and said faith can move mountains because it was witnessed by large numbers of people.

Faith is the 'facilitating wire' which carries the power of the Holy Spirit. The lower resistance in the wire the more the spirit can flow – to do things. The downer is that to have *effective* faith we must have a faith.

One thing I never advise is for anyone to read the Bible from cover to cover. Personally, I use David Suchit's Bible in a Year - on CD! Why on CD? Because you can fast forward through great sections of the Old Testament when they become boring or inappropriate. However, there are many sections I absolutely do not skip - particularly the ones relating to the tales of great faith. At its best the faith can part the seas, feed thousands of people in waterless deserts - and therefore we can today - if we have sufficient faith. 'Therefore, I tell you, whatever you ask for in vou have received praver. believe that it. and it will be yours.'(Mark:11:24)

I really do enjoy spending time in our schools with our young people as they approach the end of term. They are so excited! Within our Benefice we have two year 6 leavers services and a summer play in Lamerton Village Hall, this year being "Robin Hood". However, I do also notice that the staff are just as excited as the children as they approach the 6-week summer holiday.

The 6-week summer holiday is a treasured time for pupils and teachers alike; a time to relax, recharge, regroup, and prepare for the rigours of the next academic year. With maybe even time set aside for a holiday, whether at home or maybe even abroad. Others, outside of school may also be planning a well-deserved break.

From the Gospels, we know that Jesus took himself off to recharge both his physical and spiritual batteries, and to give himself time to hear afresh the voice of God speaking to Him. Surely if Jesus himself felt the need to take time-out, how much more should we?

In the early days of Christianity, the Egyptian desert became the chosen place of retreat for those seeking to hear God's voice. They wanted to escape the hustle and bustle of the distractions of the increasingly secular world and focus on God. But the 'distractions' existing in those days were as nothing compared to those we experience today, especially by our young people.

So, what do we have in place to recharge our spiritual batteries so we can live lives following in the footsteps of Jesus, Our Lord and Saviour? Those early desert dwellers became well-known for their thoughts, recorded as 'The Sayings of The Desert Fathers', which over the distance of almost 2,000 years, still have much to say to us. The maxim they lived by was 'Flee; be silent; pray always' – and maybe this could be ours, too. We don't have to go to the extreme of the Egyptian desert, but merely make determined efforts to take 'time out' so we can be with God in the silence of our hearts, with a prayer on our lips.

And so, this summer, amid the frantic preparations for holidays and maybe even time away, may we make the effort to focus on our spiritual lives, and learn from the Desert Fathers: 'Flee; be silent; pray always'.



### NATURE NOTES BY BLUEBELL



Summer was always sun,... Down from the moor the stream Ran swift, ran clear. The trees were leaved with song For all to hear.

The seas, the skies were blue. With stars the beach was sown. Printing the endless shore, A child: barefoot, alone. Charles Causley

At the far end of the field in the evening light, Bluebell watched with delight a family of five little foxes playing among the black bales, tumbling and running and leaping over each other.

Bluebell has been thrilled to be shown a group of moths trapped on Brentor Common (and then released) by Jennie Hale. In the day they sit perfectly still camouflaged on twigs or branches, and are almost invisible. The land around us is full of beautiful moths which Bluebell did not even know were there. Sometimes they come to the lights in house or garden. Summer is the time they fly. They sport a variety of different beautiful colours and markings, and have wonderful names: Ghost moths, Ermines, Elephant hawk moths, Privet hawk moths, Death's Head and Hummingbird Hawk moths, Scarlet tigers, Chinese characters, Buff-tip, Cinnabar, Footmen, Pale Oak Eggar, and many others.

There are more than 2,500 species of moth in Britain, vastly outnumbering butterflies, birds and mammals, but they are in dramatic decline. They are vital food for birds, particularly as caterpillars as well as adults (Blue tit chicks alone consume 35 billion caterpillars in Britain every year! Devon Wildlife Trust 2008). And they are also important pollinators and major herbivores.

Another important pollinator is the Bumblebee. Not all bumblebees are the same. There are more than 250 species in the genus *Bombus*. They gather yellow pollen in baskets on their legs to feed their young, and feed on nectar with their long tongues from flowers, which nectar they also take back and store in their nests.

The Garden bumblebee (*Bombus hortorum*) has the longest tongue of all and is the only bee easily able to pollinate and drink the nectar hidden in the long trumpet of foxgloves.


