


The final performance is no reflection on the quality of the help given by Morag, but judging by progress so far

The Story in the Bible

And there were shepherds living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over their flocks at night. An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid. I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. Today in the town of David a Saviour has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord. This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger.'

Suddenly a great company of the heavenly host appeared with the angel, praising God and saying, 'Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to men on whom his favour rests.'

When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, 'Let's go to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has told us about.'

So they hurried off and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby, who was lying in the manger. When they had seen him, they spread the word concerning what had been told them about this child, and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds said to them. But Mary treasured up all these things and pondered them in her heart. The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen, which were just as they had been told. (Luke 2:8-20)

The History behind the Shepherds and Angels in the Christmas Story


At that time, sheep farmers were seen as low or little value by other people. The sheep that they

people. The sneep that they bred would have probably been used as sacrifice animals in the temple in nearby Jerusalem. They were quietly getting on with their own business when suddenly an angel appeared to them. It's not surprising that they were afraid!



This is only the second time in the whole Bible that a group of angels rather than one angel had appeared to people, so this proved that they had a very important message to give to them. We don't know the names of the angels or how many there were of them, but in the Bible it says that there are millions of angels - so it would have been an amazing experience! The angels' words to them told them of Jesus and his amazing birth and how they could recognise him in a very crowded town.

Being curious as to what the angels meant, they went down into Bethlehem, maybe leaving a shepherd or two behind to keep guard on the sheep. The shepherds probably found Joseph, Mary and Jesus with the help of local women, running errands in the busy town, which had heard of the birth of a baby in a stable or shelter. When they had found Mary and Joseph and told them what had happened to them, the Bible says that 'The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen, which were just as they had been told.' The people they told probably weren't just the people they saw on the way back to hills, but friends and relatives in Bethlehem and Jerusalem and the people they met in the temple when they took their sheep to be sold.



A Story on the Theme of Courage

Fear is soft and smooth

"I'll tell you a secret, Marina. It was some blind children who taught me how to be brave. They can't see, so if they had never discovered the secret of how not to be afraid of the dark, they would have been forever frightened".

"It's true!" said Marina, intrigued, "Can you tell me that secret?"

"Of course! The secret is to change your eyes. Since blind children can't see, their hands are their eyes. All you have to do to conquer your fear is what they do. Shut the eyes of your face and open the eyes of your hands. Let's make a deal: tonight, when you go to bed and put out the light, if anything makes you afraid, close your eyes, carefully get out of bed, and try to see what it is that's making you scared. But do it using your hands as eyes... and tomorrow tell me how you're getting on with the fear".

Marina accepted, but she was rather worried. She knew she would need to be brave to close her eyes and go and touch whatever it was that was



frightening her, but she was willing to try. When her parents took her to bed, she herself put out the light. After a little while, she felt afraid of one of the shadows in the bedroom. Following the advice of Aunt Valerie, she closed the eyes of her face and opened the eyes of her hands. And, summoning up all her courage, she went over to touch that mysterious shadow...

The next morning Marina came running into the kitchen, a big smile on her face, and a song on her lips. "The monster is so soft and smooth!..." she cried, "It's my teddy bear!"

Remembrance Day





At 11am on 11 November 2023, 15 people put down their tools and gathered around a war grave in Marystowe's churchyard for two minutes of silence. This was not a formal ceremony. It was a group of volunteers working to clear the Churchyard. During the morning, revealed out of the ivy and undergrowth, we found the grave of Lieutenant George Edward Cleather Collinson and his wife.



Early in 1915 Lieutenant Collinson went to the front with the Cameron Highlanders, from there he went to Egypt and trained and joined the Royal Flying Corps. He returned home and joined 77 Squadron, RFC Turnhouse, Edinburgh, Lothian. He was killed in a flying accident on 13th April 1917.

RECRUITMENT OF ANNA CHAPLAINS AND ANNA FRIENDS... across our local Communities.

Anna Chaplains offer spiritual support to older people, wherever they may live, in their own homes , in care settings or for people living in sheltered accommodation.

Another way of describing this work is akin to giving pastoral care support. Anna Chaplaincy has a training built in (paid for by Exeter Diocese) which covers all skills required to be a volunteer chaplain. This includes, listening skills, learning in more details about the ageing process and talking through issues such as dementia management.

Rev'd Andy our local incumbent is very positive about this model of giving spiritual support, and would happily have a conversation with anyone who is interested in working more closely with elderly people.

The number of hours that you commit is entirely dependent on your availability. Anna Chaplains usually commit to 1-2 days a month, although when you make visits is based on your own diary flexibility. Anna Friends who support the Chaplains doing very similar work, usually have less time available, and may find

that 1/2 day a month is sufficient time to still be of value in offering spiritual.

NATURE NOTES BY BLUEBELL



"My love, the nights are coming now in the afternoons, So, maybe, stoke up the fire in the living room, And light the long candles. Hold me close, while the stars outside shiver and spell out their names -

bright as any love, anywhere, any time." from: Winter Heart; by Jackie Kay

After all the November rain and storms there is a day of quiet, of winter sunlight. Gnats dance in the light between the trees. The woods are very still.

Bluebell hears a fox bark, a pheasant alarm - cock cock! And a noisy little stream of running water.

It is mild, grey and quiet. There are no returning winter thrushes, redwings, or fieldfares yet.

The woodcock is waiting to come, perhaps with the next full moon..

The tiny goldcrest is said to hitch a ride on his back across the sea.

There has been no frost to speak of yet and any red-russet gold beech leaves still hang on the young trees. Brown leaves hang longest on the oak trees. Bright yellow gorse is still in flower.



A robin's sweet song trickles through the air.


Then there are two! Robins are usually solitary, but will sing and even fight in midwinter to establish their breeding territory.

Males and females both do this, both sing, and both wear scarlet breast feathers. The fight may change into a courting chase round the garden as the robins pair up and plight their troth around Christmas time. The robin has recently been reclassified as of the flycatcher family rather than the thrush, along with the chat and nightingale. (2023)

"Sweet robin sits in the bush, singing so rarely." *from: The Heart of Midlothian; by Sir Walter Scott.*

The friendly robin does usually sing from fairly close to the ground, in contrast to the thrush that seeks the highest tree-top branch from which to sing. A bird of broadleaf woodland edges, its typical habit is to perch on a low branch or spade handle, following the gardener, or originally wild boar or deer, and drop down to pick up worms and grubs and insects from the earth they have disturbed.

Once a robin and three times a wren has had to be guided out of Bluebell's house through a window recently.

GARDEN NOTES BY DOUG

Well, the leaves are brown and the sky is a hazy shade of winter

(as Simon & Garfunkel said). As I write this Storm Ciaran has faded and left many leaves in the trees whispering Louise.

It's a difficult time of year in the garden but when there is a bit of nice weather - even if it's cold - it can be very rewarding to get out and do a bit of tidying up. Leaves, cutting back, pruning, mulching, turning that compost heap, cleaning the greenhouse, weeding, dividing; thinking about enhancing the beauty of your garden (forget about the lawn, except for clearing the leaves off).



Doug doesn't do lawns. He's given up. Just grass with whatever comes!



So much easier and less toxic than all those chemical lawn treatments.

Nice things in a winter garden are plants which give some architectural structure and interest. One my favourites is Phlomis or Jerusalem sage. This is a spreading perennial which needs very little attention and produces tall flower shoots with nice yellow flowers in summer and gorgeous seedheads in autumn through

to spring - if you leave them alone and the birds don't rip 'em to bits!

Another nice favourite is Japanese anemone. This is another spreading perennial with lovely flowers in summer and interesting seedheads in winter. These make an interesting addition to flower arrangements.





And next year you could grow some annual flowers to dry.

Helichrysum/paper daisy flowers, are an easy choice.

If you need inspiration, visit the National Trust Cotehele Garland over Christmas. 60ft long with thousands of dried flowers grown on site. Open 18th November to 7th January.






