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## Things we know for certain about Christmas

We know for certain that our Lord died at around 3pm on April 3, AD 33. However, we have no such certainty for the date of His birth. This would not be unusual for parents of Joseph and Mary's station not to rec-

ord the date of His birth. Many theologians derive possible dates from the beginning of His teaching as recorded in Luke 3:1-2. However, the words 'nativity' or 'Christmas' are never

mentioned in the Bible. In fact, Christmas was not celebrated until the 3rd Century in Rome.

We do know for certain that Mary was a virgin and that she was visited by the Angel Gabriel. (Luke 1:26–38) We also know that Our Lord was born in Bethlehem. It is unlikely that there was either an inn or inn-keeper. His birth place was more likely a 1st Century AirBnB. Families let out rooms – especially during festivals. The Holy Family almost certainly would have stayed in a larger ground floor room where there would have been a manger for animals brought in during cold winter nights. There is no doubt that shepherds came and celebrated His birth as there are so many first-hand witness accounts. (Luke 2:8-20) Equally we know that they were miraculously informed of His birth by angels. However, we have no references to sheep in the Gospels.


The wise men arrived after the birth of Christ. We don't know when or how many there were. However, we do know that their three gifts were prophetic - gold for a king, frankincense for divinity and myrrh as a symbol of death.

We also know for certain that miraculous dreams played a key role in the protection of the Christ child. Joseph was warned in a dream to protect Mary as she was to give birth to our Saviour (Matthew 1:18-21). Equally the wise men were warned in a dream not to tell Herod of the location of the Christ Child (Matthew 2:13). Lastly Joseph was warned in a dream to emigrate to Egypt to avoid Herod's massacre of the first-born sons in Bethlehem. After Herod had died Joseph was again informed in a dream that it was safe to return (Matthew 2:19-23) Perhaps the only strange thing about the commemoration of our Lord's birth, crucifixion and resurrection is that Easter should not be celebrated on 5th April – every year!

We spend almost all of December in the season of Advent. A time of preparation and reflection, as we look forward to Christmas; and think about what we ought to be doing to be ready to meet God's Son, both now and when he returns. The Christmas season itself is a time of celebration as we thank God for the gift of his Son and the fact that God chose to walk among us.

Much of our time during the Advent season is inevitably spent preparing for the Christmas season. Thinking about presents and decorations, food, and drink. Planning celebrations and gatherings with family and friends. Working out ways to see those close to us, sometimes in a very short space of time. So, the big question for us this year, as in every other year, is how do we engage with the real meaning and purpose of Advent and Christmas?

Perhaps we could try to spend some time each day during the season of Advent reading our Bible. Perhaps we could spend some time each day during Advent in prayer. Perhaps we could try to think of those around us for whom Christmas will be a difficult time, those who are unwell, lonely, frightened, bereaved. This year we will be holding a new service called "The Longest Night" on Wednesday 21<sup>st</sup> December. The service itself is very simple, a mixture of carols and readings to tell the Christmas story; prayers which acknowledge pain and emptiness alongside the Christian hope; a reflection which gently speaks of light in darkness, with times of silence, not rushing to fill every moment with word or song. We will also stay seated throughout the whole service. This is a service for anyone and everyone who wants to pause and reflect. Please do also keep your eyes open for our new services of "Wholeness and Healing" which will start in the New Year. Canon Tim Thompson has kindly written about this further on in the magazine.

But behind all our plans, we need to think about who Jesus is and why he came to be one of us. Jesus was, and is, not only God's son, but God – God with us, Emmanuel. God chose to come here and be born as one of us. To identify with us, to walk with us, share with us, experience what we experience and, ultimately to die for us and reconcile us to God. How should we respond? Not an easy question to answer, but perhaps one to think about as we travel through Advent and approach Christmas.

I would like to finish by thanking Tim Culverhouse who has kindly edited our magazine for these past few years. I have given Tim a little gift on your behalf to thank him for all his great work.

#### AMY'S CONFIRMATION

As some of you know, I was confirmed into the Church on Monday 17th October 2022. But what does that actually mean? We thought it would be nice if I gave you an overview of the experience, so here goes!

Confirmation is a special church service where a person/s reaffirms the promises that were made on their behalf when they were baptised. e.g. if you were baptised as a baby or young child, promises to God were made by Godparents, Parents or Guardians on your behalf. Confirmation is a special service where you make these promises for yourself. Baptism is a pre-requisite for confirmation (if you aren't baptised don't worry! It doesn't mean you can't be Confirmed; I recommend speaking to your Reverend to find out more first).

Confirmation is a wonderful occasion; the service is run by your local Bishop (in my case the very newly (10 days in!) appointed Bishop of Plymouth) and is tailored specifically to Confirmations. There are hymns and readings and a lot of the Parish Reverends themselves will be in attendance to guide and support you (and the bishop!) through the service. It's not something that you do on your own; there will be other people at the service also making the promises for themselves too.

You would have a couple of pre-confirmation classes with your local Reverend where you talk through Confirmation in detail and learn more about the Creeds and the 39 articles of faith (which are really interesting and themselves, through understanding, help bring you closer to God too). But don't worry; you don't have to memorise anything or speak publicly to the congregation!

It's a very special occasion and friends, family and your local church community can of course attend the service and will likely pray for and support you too.It takes place either at your local church, a cathedral or in another church within your Parish.

At a certain point in the service, the Bishop will lay their hands on your head and there will be special prayers; this is the truly magical moment where you are filled with Gods love and blessings. Afterwards is a time to relax in elation and pride with your nearest and dearest.

For me, it was a such a special evening and will be a treasured memory that I hold dear forever. The support and love was overwhelming and the atmosphere and general feeling was so uplifting, wonderful and magical.

I implore you, if you're thinking about it, do explore it as I did. You will know, and God will show you, when the time is right for you to take that step.

For anyone thinking about it; I wish you good luck and enjoy your faith journey.



When Herod heard about this, he told the men that when they found the child, they should come back and tell him where the child was so that he could worship him too. The truth is, Herod didn't really want to worship Jesus, he wanted to kill him. Why? Perhaps his heart was too small! Herod was so selfish that he was afraid Jesus would become more popular than he was and perhaps even take over his kingdom.

Well, Herod's plan to kill Jesus didn't work. After the wise men found Jesus and gave him gifts, an angel told them about Herod's plan and they went back home without telling Herod where they had found Jesus. An angel also appeared to Joseph and warned him of Herod's plan and told him to take Mary and the baby Jesus to Egypt where they would be safe.

And so, we see that since the very first Christmas, Grinches have been trying to steal the joy of Christmas. There may be some "Grinches" that are trying to steal your Christmas joy. It will never work -- unless your heart is too small. Make sure that your heart is big enough to share the love and joy of Christmas with everyone you meet -- not just at Christmas -- but all year long.

Dear Father, we thank you for the joy that Jesus brings. Help us to share that joy with everyone we meet. In Jesus' name we pray, amen.



## A Church's response to Wholeness and Healing

The notion of "wholeness and healing" has been in the general public's mind for sometime and has its high profile adherents like Meghan and Harry Sussex. More often it is associated with mental well-being and often, to the older generation, seems to be an excuse for not getting on with life. So what is the Church's take on it all?

From the point of view of scripture humans are complex beings where the physical, emotional, social and spiritual aspects of a persons' life come together. The Gospels use the term "healing" to describe both the physical and the broader salvation that Jesus brings. In the New Testament the notion of sickness is associated with powerless and vulnerability in the face of sin and death. Here the Christian receives God's grace which can be expressed as an experience of healing and strength to bear weakness. Healing isn't just about the physical aspects of life but has a much deeper meaning in how we relate to our circumstances and to God. In this way acts of healing in the Gospels are related to the restoration of the individual to a place of worth within the social order. The phrase "By His wounds you have been healed" (1 Peter 2:24) makes a powerful link between the pain we feel and the pain of Jesus in his own suffering on the Cross. God's image in us. tarnished and marred, is reconciled and restored by Christ and brought back to God.

Thus healing, reconciliation and restoration are integral to the Good News of Jesus Christ; and for this reason prayer for individuals, focused through the laying on of hands and /or anointing with oil have a central role to play in the Church's ministry. Both can be seen as a proclamation of the Good News and the presence of the Spirit in the life of the Church.

Now much of this might seem a little esoteric and it is important to remember that the Church's role in healing doesn't preclude the skills of doctors and those professionals involved in healing. It is not an alternative but works along side them. Likewise we need to remember that prayers for physical healing have a mental and spiritual component which may show itself in ways which differ to what was originally intended. Christ meets our needs in ways we don't always realise at the time. Often the healing power of prayer only becomes apparent long after the initial event.



Largely through ignorance and lack of understanding the modern Church has lost this central role of healing in its ministry. Most churches don't have healing services and when they do they are often not part of the mainstream service provision but limited to an occasional evening service once a month or provision for individuals when asked. Healing as part of the Church's ministry is worth much more than this. It is central to the worshipping community's sense of well-being and is a central plank in our relationship with God and each other.

#### NATURE NOTES BY BLUEBELL

"God bless the birds of winter That hop across the snow And peck the fallen seeds and fruits Of summer long ago." Lois Rock



The little bird which is dearest to many is the Robin Redbreast whose sweet song rings out from his or her perch on a low branch in the winter air.

There is usually an answering song from a rival robin as they sort out their territories. Males and females both hold territories and can be very aggressive, though their song sounds so sweet and almost melancholy. There are usually three or four slightly varying verses to a robin's song and like many birds there is a slight regional variation or accent. The robin has been associated with Christmas because of its cheerful red breast which has linked it with Postmen bringing greetings and presents at Christmas in their red vans, wearing a red jacket. Also there is a tale of it impaling its breast and bleeding on the thorns of his crown as it flew up to try to relieve Jesus of the painful crown he wore on the Cross.

On Dartmoor in winter there is a special stillness and fresh cold loveliness. Sun and cloud shadows and a fresh cold wind race over brown bracken, green grass, creamy pale old grass, glittering rushing streams and grey stones.

A little stonechat rises from the gorse with a cry like two pebbles knocked together.


Fields of Solar panels have been an unpopular sight to some, but they have been proved in Australia to help flocks of sheep who graze around them not only "to safely graze", but to thrive. 

#### GARDEN NOTES BY DOUG November 2022



Mid November and Doug's waiting patiently for a frost, surprised how much is still in flower. The wisteria, still in leaf, battered by wind and rain, has been ripped from the wall. But it'll be fine - it's very flexible. Once the leaves are

gone it will be tied back and pruned. Some of the roses could also do with a prune just to reduce their windage and prevent the roots being disturbed.

Mistletoe equals Christmas. As Christians, lovers are expected to kiss under it. Kissing under mistletoe was popular amongst servants in Victorian times and, apparently, a man could kiss any woman standing under mistletoe and bad luck would befall any woman who refused. You might not get away with that now? Careful where you stand my lovely.

Although you've probably got plenty of things to do, now is a good time to think about what you're going to grow next year. If you're looking for something very easy think about nasturtiums. If they're in a bed they will often seed themselves and you can pop the flowers in a salad. Another thing would be kale. This is very easy to grow almost all year round and is very nutritious, fresher and tastier than the supermarket. It does need some protection from the cabbage white and its caterpillars though; but they're not around all year.

You could always grow some flowers from seed to dry for this time next year. Helichrysums (say). Very easy to grow, then hang the flowers upside down by the stems to dry, maybe in the shed. If you need a bit of inspiration, go and see the garland at Cotehele over Christmas. Mind you, it is 60 ft and full of dried flowers.

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
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
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
