

#### Dear Friends,

Happy New Year to you all! I hope that you have been able to enjoy your Christmas celebrations and have managed to avoid

as many of the bugs that are going around as possible. Morag and I have certainly enjoyed our first Christmas with you all here in the South Tamar Mission Community, and we would like to extend our thanks to you all for making us feel so welcome.

It feels very much like a season of *firsts* at the moment. I am

experiencing many life events in our churches and communities for the first time, and this is my first opportunity to speak with you all through "the vicar's letter" in the Parish News. While they may be firsts for me, many services and events may be very familiar to you, but of course these are the first occasions of you sharing them with me, and there are some more shared firsts approaching. This will be our first Lent season with you, and Andy has asked me to lead the Lent course for the first time, taking us into our first Easter with you all.

Lent is a season of self-examination, of reconciliation, and of preparation. In keeping with those themes, I have picked out a course for us that is intended to focus our minds on what it might mean to be more like Jesus where we are. The eight-week course is called Growing on the Frontline, and it hopes to support us in affecting spiritual change in our day-to-day lives, rather than being an academic exercise. As part of the course, different forms of personal prayer will be introduced, some contemporary and some from older traditions, like the Examen and Lectio Divina. Our hope is that the course will help us to recognise where we might be living a life short of God's best for us, to offer ways of drawing closer through the Holy Spirit to find new ways forwards, and to bring us into a renewed relationship with Jesus and the people around us in readiness for Easter. I do hope you will join us for the course, which will start on 8<sup>th</sup> February.

To mark the start of Lent itself, we will be holding an Ash Wednesday service of Holy Communion at St Peter's, Lamerton, at 10am. As with previous years, this service will involve the imposition of ashes where, if you choose, you may come forward to receive the sign of the cross in the ashes created from the burning of last year's palm crosses. This is an outward sign of our inward repentance and a symbol of our commitment to Jesus Christ.

I wish you all a time of refreshing reflection through Lent. Time not just to think about what we do for Jesus in our lives, but how we can be more like Jesus in our everyday.

#### Do we survive death? Where's the proof of Heaven and Hell?

We have a pond at the end of our garden. It is our view into another utterly different water breathing and virtually gravity free world. Beings there can fly up and down whenever they want to and breathe water! In our 'above water' world we are stuck on the ground and if we breathe water we die. We can

never have their freedom just as they can never ours.

The roof of their world is the silver surface of the water. From certain angles water beings can see through their silver ceiling and see our world. It must be just as unbelievable to them as their world is to us. This does not mean that their reality is any less real than our reality. In fact, we have a silver ceiling of our own. Beyond us is a spiritual world full of unimaginable freedoms and splendours. Death is our silver ceiling. Happily, we know for certain that human beings have spiritual identities which survive death and so can pass through that ceiling. How do we know? There is a vast body of literature and testimony from people who have had near death experiences and have been revived - often on hospital operating tables. Remarkably many witnessed their own resuscitation being performed by the hospital staff! Crucially they were able to see without their physical eyes, to hear without their physical ears and think without their physical brains. We know this because they were able to recall the conversations the medical staff had and saw procedures they performed.

Near death survivors become humane 'amphibians' for minutes or even hours before their human body draws them back to our physical world. For a while they become like the frogs in our pond – amphibious. Importantly saints and prophets are spiritually amphibious. Equally there are numerous references to life after death in the scriptures. Our Lord even told parables about this world and the next (e.g., 'Rich Man and Lazarus' Luke 16:19-31.)

Usually, the near-death experience is one of overwhelming peace and love - but not always. Heaven exists and so does hell. Why not watch the first episode of Ricki Stern's Netflix documentary 'Surviving Death'. It records real-life testimony of people passing through our silver ceiling and of their joy at meeting loving, deceased family and friends. It is coming to us all - so be prepared!

#### ANNA CHAPLAIN or ANNA FRIEND .... which will <u>YOU</u> be?

Perhaps you're someone who has been quietly supporting older people



for years. Or do you sense a calling to do this work? Whatever your starting point, Anna Chaplaincy can link those who share a passion for working with older people, creating opportunities to learn from each other and providing support through ongoing training and through resources such as the Anna Chaplaincy Handbook.

Named after the faithful widow Anna, who appears with Simeon in Luke's gospel, Anna Chaplaincy is a community-based network that supports older people and their carers, working across many denominations.

Anna Chaplains work in care and nursing homes, private homes, churches and community groups, and are there for people of strong, little or no faith. Male or female, each works within their local church context. Anna Chaplains may have Anna Friends to work side by side with them.

Anna Chaplaincy offers an excellent training course consisting of six, two -hour sessions, paid for by the Diocese.

At present, there are 29 Anna Chaplains and Anna Friends across the Exeter Diocese with a further 10 in training but there are only three in the Tavistock area. With the increasing number of elderly people in our local area, we are looking for volunteers who may be interested in getting involved.

As Robert Atwell, Bishop of Exeter, says: "Across Devon, Anna Chaplains are walking beside older people in our communities, encouraging them to mine the seams of spirituality and faith so that the joys and disappointments of life can better be integrated and the gift of life celebrated. Is God calling you to walk with them?"


And what about the town? In the town they still believe that to enter the Cave of Fear is the worst of all punishments...

#### NATURE NOTES BY BLUEBELL Feb - March 2023

What would the world be, once bereft Of wet and of wildness? Let them be left, O let them be left. wildness and wet:

Long live the weeds and the wilderness yet.

From Inversnaid by Gerard Manley Hopkins

The historic right to wild camp on parts of Dartmoor has been defeated in the courts in the case brought against Dartmoor National Park by South Dartmoor landowners Alexander and Diana Darwall.

For centuries many people have loved passionately the wilderness of Dartmoor and treasured the right to roam freely there, a historic and precious legacy. They fear that the ruling is the tip of an iceberg that will curtail our freedom to discover and get close to nature in our national parks. The right to roam for open air recreation has been formally permitted since 1985, but the definition of open air recreation was left vague and wild camping was not explicitly excluded so it remained a legal right before this ruling. Many landowners will happily give permission for wild camping but it will now need to be sought.

The land and its wildlife is cared for and managed by Dartmoor National Park Authority, hill farmers, Commoners and others.

Public access and landowners' rights are protected by a Code of Conduct, the principles of which include 'leave no trace', a maximum camping duration of two nights in any one place, carrying everything you need in a

backpack, and travelling by horseback or on foot, away from roads.


Dartmoor is the only place in England and Wales where it was legal to wild camp across most of the 70,000 acres of the National Park, 0.2% of England.

"At this moment of ecological crisis we have never needed these opportunities to connect deeply with nature more" said Robert Macfarlane, author of 'The Wild Places'. He has backed *The Stars Are For Everyone* campaign, and so has Raynor Winn, author of 'The Salt Path'. (*The Moorlander Jan 6-19<sup>th</sup> 2023*).

Who doesn't want the right to sleep under the stars, in the quiet wilderness? Last summer Bluebell saw the joyful sense of adventure in the eyes of young people setting off alone up a green track through rocks and heather and bracken towards a distant Tor: Duke of Edinburgh's Award winning youngsters, Army and Marine cadets, lovers of nature and adventure, all.


